SUSTAINABILITY

We began **converting over 5 acres of turf grass to native pollinator species** at Lake
of the Woods and Middle Fork River Forest
Preserves. As a result, we will reduce staff
mowing time, reduce the carbon output of
our mowers, remove some troublesome wet
areas from the mowing rotation, increase our
carbon sequestration capacity and provide
additional high quality habitat for preserve
wildlife. The pollinator planting near Elks
Lake Pavilion will also provide a resource
for education programs.

We took advantage of the Ameren IL Energy Efficiency Program for lighting to retrofit the majority of fluorescent lights at Lake of the Woods Forest Preserve to LED. The Ameren program covered nearly half of the cost (\$22,720 total, with CCFPD paying \$11,631), and the lighting is predicted to pay for itself in energy use reduction savings within three years.

PARTNERSHIPS

In the spring of 2021, The Champaign County Forest Preserve District (CCFPD), Urbana Park District (UPD) and the Champaign County Farm Bureau Foundation - Ag in the Classroom (CCFBF) created and distributed 1,492 Free At-Home Exploration kits to 2nd graders in Champaign County.

These kits included six activities aligned to the Next Generation Science Standards and Common Core that helped students answer the question: "How and why is the Earth constantly changing?" All materials needed to complete the activities were included in the kits.

These kits were provided at no cost to the students. Funding for the kits came from a generous grant from the Community Foundation of East Central Illinois grant as well as funding from the Forest Preserve Friends Foundation, Urbana Parks Foundation and the Champaign County Farm Bureau Foundation.

CCFPD Letter from the Executive Director

It is with pleasure that we present the Champaign County Forest Preserve District's 2021 Annual Report. This report provides a sampling of some of the incredible outcomes

we have achieved in service to Champaign County residents and in support of our mission to protect Champaign County's natural and cultural resources and inspire people to care for, enjoy, and explore their natural world.

As a result of the successful referendum in 2020, we were able to get started on the backlog of maintenance and capital projects and completed an additional 12 projects that we would not have been able to do otherwise.

We continued to steward over 4,000 acres of land, through clearing hundreds of acres of invasive plant species, collecting native seeds, and planting more than 1,700 trees.

Our commitment to high-quality environmental and cultural education continued to adapt to the changing pandemic

After receiving the support of the Champaign County residents

District used the increase in funds from the approved referendum

in the 2020 election, the Champaign County Forest Preserve

to get to work right away in 2021 making good on the promise

of maintaining and improving the infrastructure, buildings and

landscape by providing in-person or online program as appropriate and reaching more than 20,000 participants.

The CCFPD remains fiscally sound and responsible. We were awarded nearly \$2 million in grant funds, which were then leveraged through the fundraising efforts of the Forest Preserve Friends Foundation. The Foundation raised more than \$175,000 to provide matches for grants and to fund other projects and programs. Both our campground and golf course saw exponential growth in use, with the camparound more than doubling its revenue from 2020 and the golf course welcoming the highest player total since 2007 and yielding more than \$900,000 in revenue.

The successful outcomes reflected in this report are attributable to the support of the county residents, donors, partners, and hundreds of volunteers including our dedicated five-member Board of Commissioners. Thank you, all, for your efforts in helping us shine throughout 2021.


